### PROVINCE III RETREAT/FORMA CONFERENCE



The hybrid Province III Retreat and FORMA conference was deemed a great success by attendees (in spite of some heating issues at Claggett). The Rev. Dr. Robert Phillips of the Diocese of Washington led our retreat time in the mornings, with afternoons spent in webinars and zoom sessions with FORMA. Evenings were spent in fellowship, talking, putting together puzzles, playing games, and attending "A Case for Love."

A main theme for what attendees liked best was connecting with other formation leaders, especially those nearby: "The best parts were the live parts: meeting other folks from P3, conversations both in the program and at meals and social time, and the spiritual program with Robert and chance to pray together." Many indicated a desire for "more opportunities like this- I am committing to once a year for myself at least - to gather around Jesus with fellow disciples away from it all to reflect on where God is in our ministry and where God might be leading us next." Many liked the geographic proximity of a regional gathering over a national meeting, and the time and cost savings that come with that. Other comments included: "I felt very cared for," and "I think this model is worth repeating."

So, keep your eyes out for possibly holding another regional retreat/conference in future years!

# ONE BISHOP'S REPORT ON THE SPRING HOUSE OF BISHOPS MEETING

The Rt. Rev. Audrey Scanlan sent the following report on the HOB meeting to her diocese, which gives good information about how the HOB works for the wider province as well:

I am writing this as I make my way back to you from the "spring" meeting of the House of Bishops of The Episcopal Church. I've been with my sibling bishops at Camp Allen, a camp, retreat, and conference center in the "Piney Woods" of Navasota, Texas. Camp Allen is an outstanding facility with plenty of acreage to enjoy God's creation: hiking trails, walking paths, woods and lakefront property all satisfy the need to stretch one's legs during breaks between meetings.

Members of our 110 dioceses in The Episcopal Church gathered for a week of study, prayer, fellowship and business. There were about 125 bishops present as well as members of the Presiding Bishop's staff, language interpreters for our bishops who speak Spanish and Mandarin, two chaplains, and a musician. We are a Body that is growing in its diversity; we are blessed by a number of bishops who are people of color, and the gender balance has increased, now, to include 36% women. We also seem to be skewing younger as a House (but that may just be my perspective as one of the "elders.") Now in the 9th year of my episcopate, I am no longer a "new bishop" and it is exciting work to learn the names of and meet all the new bishops who have been consecrated since our last meeting. Since I was consecrated in 2015, (my number in the succession of TEC bishops is 1089,) there have been 76 new bishops elected and consecrated in our church.

The House of Bishops gathers twice a year. Covid altered our meeting pattern, of course, in the last few years, and our fall meeting this past September was held on Zoom. The last time that we were together in person was last March at Camp McDowell in Alabama.

At this meeting we carried on our business as usual, but with the notable absence of our Presiding Bishop, Michael Curry. Bishop Curry's health has kept him from participating in our gatherings this year and we all missed his charismatic preaching, his generous spirit, sense of humor, deep wisdom and faithfulness.

The pattern at our meetings is to gather in a plenary session of 2.5 hours in the morning and again for 2.5 hours in the afternoon, to worship together in the morning and evening, to share meals and recreation together, and to meet formally in regional (provincial) groupings as well as informal, self-selected groups. In our time this week I attended a meeting of the Province III (Mid-Atlantic) bishops where we discussed opportunities for collaboration among our dioceses and some of the issues that we expect to come before us at General Convention in June. I went to meetings of Bishops United Against Gun Violence where we talked about a program for youth at General Convention to train our young people in advocacy and community organizing, and I also attended a meeting of the "Green Bishops" where we discussed some of the resolutions coming to General Convention encouraging Creation Care advocacy and the "Anglican Communion Forest," an initiative where bishops distribute saplings to confirmands as a way to mark that sacramental rite. I met with the committee to which I have been assigned for General Convention- a legislative committee to address changes to our disciplinary canons known as "Title IV" and I worked with the small group that is designing an April meeting in Charlotte for discernment of the House of Bishops regarding the candidates for the election of the next Presiding Bishop.

One of the most meaningful meetings that I attended was during a session called "Open Space" where we were encouraged to spend the afternoon discussing topics of interest generated by the group. I joined the group that was organized to discuss part-time ministry in our church, lay leader training and "how we are getting church done" in an era of a priest shortage and a decreased capacity to pay full time clergy. I was proud to talk about the good work that we are doing in our Stevenson School for Ministry and the Commission on Ministry forming pathways for licensed lay ministers. I learned that the challenge of staffing parishes in our church extends to places in our rural dioceses, to those ministering to indigenous populations, and even in urban settings. In this conversation we talked about the need for quality lay formation for leadership and how to encourage small congregations in their life and ministry.

Because of the number of new bishops, there was a focus on building relationships in our collegium and learning about each other's ministry contexts. We talked openly about the challenges of maintaining ministry with fewer resources and smaller congregations but this was by no means a meeting where we wrung our hands and were in despair; in fact, this meeting filled me with hope for our future, with gratitude for for the strength of lay and ordained ministers in our church, and with energy to keep on working in Jesus' Way of Love, spreading God's Good News to the world.

We spent significant amounts of time in prayer- we prayed together as a Body, we prayed the psalms, we sat in contemplative silence being fed by the presence of our Lord, and we prayed around the Table, nurtured by the sacrament of Christ's body and blood. We prayed for peace, for the healing of the world, for prisoners and refugees, for an end to conflict and for the intercession of the Prince of Peace. And we prayed for all of you, grateful for the ministry of our dioceses.

I was honored to accept the invitation of the Presiding Bishop to be one of the preachers at our meeting. In addition to the chaplain staff and leadership, three of us were given the opportunity to offer a sermon to our colleagues. It was both exciting and a little daunting. I think I did ok. I spent my "sabbath day" (Saturday) on an extended solo hike on the back trails of the Camp and turned it into a "contemplative hike" where I paused for silent prayer in several spots along the way. I saw lots of squirrels, one deer, a turtle, a few wood ducks and an opossum (!) in my travels. I also joined some friends for horseback riding in the afternoon; my

horse "Flash" did not live up to his name- I spent significant time tugging on his reins to keep him from eating the foliage along the trail. I also sang with the House of Bishops choir in our worship services; in my years in the House this has become a favorite activity for me.

I am grateful to our diocese for this time away with my colleagues, and I am anxious to get home and continue our good work together. There's a meeting of our Task Force to Support Small Churches tomorrow afternoon, a zoom gathering to discuss Creation Care tomorrow night, a Council of Trustees meeting on Thursday, and a zoom meeting of our retired clergy on Friday. This weekend I will enjoy a visitation at St. Andrew's, Harrisburg and then make my way to St Luke's, Lebanon to celebrate the good work of our collaborative mission with the Diocese of Bethlehem to raise funds to reduce medical debt. It is a full and wonderful life in Christ that we are living together.

Workshop #1: 2025 UTO Grant Application Supporter Training

Many folks help with UTO grant applications along the way from the initial idea to completed and submitted packet. This year, instead of just walking you through the grant application, we are going to train you on what to look for when helping an applicant, when to ask for help, and how the new dual deadline process works. The goal is to not have applicants get conflicting information locally by ensuring that our leaders have the best information accessible to them. If you complete the workshop

and a quick online ten question quiz, you'll get a certificate saying that you've gone through the training, and we'll list you on our website (if you would like) as someone trained locally to help with applications. You will also receive as much support as you request from UTO Staff andBoard members during the application process to help your local applicant. It is our hope that this helps our leaders feel more confident in supporting applicants and helps our staff have more support in reviewing drafts.

#### Workshop #2: 2024-2025 UTO Formation Updates

We've been foreshadowing a lot of changes that are coming to our UTO formation materials, and now will be the moment to learn all about the new ways we are resourcing congregations to grow in gratitude for the 2024-2025 program year. We'll debut the new material ordering form and process, talk about the materials we offer, and how best to share them if you are a parish UTO Leader or a diocesan UTO Leader. This is a great chance to hear about what is coming so you can share it with your stewardship, formation, and other church leadership who might like access to free resources for congregational life.


### Workshop #3: 2024-2027 New for UTO Leaders
